- Participating in fire department coldwater rescue training and self-defense tactics training with deputies. One of the many tasks that firefighters are prepared to perform is coldwater rescue. Whether it is an ice fisherman in trouble or a dog that has fallen through, responders must be equipped to accomplish the mission. I recently joined Kalispell's "A Shift" in an Evergreen creek where the two inches of ice was broken so "victims" (me!) and rescuers could slide into the icy cold water and practice the essential steps of getting out. The rescuer helped to position the backboard in front of the victim, arranged the ropes and guided the board, while the crew on land pulled the victim to a safe area. The big orange suits were amazingly warm and the only frigid feeling was from the water splashing on our exposed faces.
